In my January President's Post, I mentioned my parents are aging in place in their home in southwest Florida. I just visited them and helped celebrate their 95<sup>th</sup> and 97<sup>th</sup> birthdays. I know I am biased, but most others agree they are truly amazing people.

On this visit, I noticed my mother is starting to decline. She is still able to take care of herself, but she gets very fatigued. We are now looking into some options to provide her some

assistance. There are many things to consider such as: What kind of help and who should provide it? Does their long term care policy cover such care, or do they pay out of pocket? How will they transition from just a little help to eventually needing more help?

Coming up with solutions to these issues isn't easy. My brothers and I can think of some feasible options, but my parents are reluctant. They don't want to go to an assisted living facility and they're not too keen on having help come to their home. Meanwhile, my brother who helps them is experiencing caregiver burnout. Our family situation sounds like many others I hear about from friends and read about in journals and magazines.

I strongly recommend families have honest and thoughtful conversations about loved ones who are aging in place. I support senior adults who want to age in place as there are many advantages to that lifestyle. On the other hand, these same independent and capable people must also have a plan for when they are no longer able to function independently.

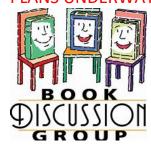
