ON A WARM JUNE EVENING SOME OF US WERE SWEEP AWAY TO A REFRESHINGLY COLD CLIMATE DURING A VIRTUAL HAPPY HOUR

Worldwide only five percent of commercial pilots are women and one of them happens to be Melissa Haney, Peggy Reinhold's relative. By the time she finished recounting how she became the first female pilot for Air Inuit, some of us were ready to head to Montreal and book a flight to far northern Canada with her at the controls. With a broad smile, deep dimples, and a charisma that comes through even on a Zoom chat, who better to introduce us to Inuit culture in the land of polar bears, ice flows and snowy mountains...and, yes, short runways?

Melissa flies a Dash 8 Combi-300 which is designed to take off and land on short runways while carrying up to 4,000 pounds of cargo and 45 passengers. She is spending the summer in Miami training to become a Boeing 737 pilot as Air Inuit's demand for cargo and passenger flights is rapidly increasing.



Airplanes were an ordinary means of transportation in remote northern Quebec where Melissa grew up. Based in Montreal, Air Inuit serves as a lifeline for the

indigenous people in Northern Canada.

Melissa was a 19-year-old college student when an opportunity arose for her to become a flight attendant with the airline. She soon decided she wanted to be in the cockpit. In 2017, Canadian Ninety-Nine, an affiliate of the 99s, an international organization of women pilots, released a postage stamp in commemoration of her promotion to captain, the first woman to achieve that status. Her dedication and sense of purpose have enabled her to excel as a pilot, but also as an incredible role model for the indigenous people of northern Canada.

She is married to Pierre-Olivier, also an Air Inuit captain, and they have two children. Her young daughter wants to be a pilot like her parents and her son sees himself as an astronaut journeying into space. Melissa would be delighted if that is what the future holds for them. The sky is not the limit for Melissa and her family; it is far-flung horizons and stellar careers.

ACADEMY OF LIFELONG LEARNING OFFERS FALL CLASSES ONLINE
